# Virginia Safe Routes to School

Program Annual Report - 2020-2022

Just a generation ago, 90% of students living within a mile of school walked or biked to school. Today, just over 10% of students walk or bike to school. Federal legislatures recognized the need to reverse this trend in 2005, passing legislation to establish the federal SRTS program. The goals of SRTS are to enable and encourage children to walk and bike to school while making biking and walking to school safer and more appealing. The Virginia Safe Routes to School program provides a comprehensive approach to building local SRTS programs, with strategies that aim to build safe streets, welcoming campuses, safe behaviors, and a supportive culture. The program also offers several grants to help your local program grow!

This annual report will highlight ways that the program continued to flourish throughout the unfamiliar times of the COVID-19 pandemic. From the total closure of schools in 2020, to the gradual return by the '21-'22 school year, the program maintained it's resiliency. Through Bike to Anywhere Day, neighborhood scavenger hunts, and more, the program has continued to impact communities across Virginia.

### **QuickStart Mini-grants**

More than **75 QuickStart mini-grants were** awarded from **2020 to 2022**. Schools used these \$1,000 grants to purchase safety equipment and fun incentives to encourage students to participate in events. Uplifting disadvantaged communities is important to Virginia SRTS, and half of all grant funds went to Title 1 schools. Many different people applied for QuickStart mini-grants, including Local SRTS Coordinators, PE teachers, PTA members, and caregivers.

### Walkabout Mini-grants

Walkabout Mini-grants gather students, school staff, local government representatives, and community groups to **identify solutions for walking and biking issues near a school**. These grants are designed to prepare recipients to then apply for TAP infrastructure funding to implement the identified solutions. The Virginia SRTS team helps to identify infrastructure improvements and changes to arrival and dismissal processes. Throughout COVID, the Virginia SRTS team continued to administer socially distanced Walkabout Minigrants. **Half of the grant recipients from 2020-2022 were Title 1 schools**

#### Infrastructure Grants


Between 2020 and 2022, over fifteen million dollars in SRTS funding was awarded to improve the safety of children walking and biking to schools across Virginia. VDOT, through TAP, funded thirteen projects. These included constructing new sidewalks, filling in sidewalk gaps, and improving crossings with curb extensions, pedestrian signals, and refuge islands. Although the program recognizes that the grant recipients are not geographically diverse, that is a priority of the program moving forward when selecting awardees.

### Non-Infrastructure Grants

The non-infrastructure components of the TAP Grants are focused on funding Local SRTS Coordinator positions. The Local SRTS Coordinators are full and part-time roles within school divisions, local governments and health organizations. They teach bike units, host local events, connect with families and school staff, and support additional activities that foster a culture of walking and biking.

Between 2020-2022, **1.3 million dollars** were distributed across the state to fund Local Coordinator salaries.

### **Activity Highlights**

- Local, VDOT funded coordinators conducted virtual bike and PE classes
- The local coordinator in Galax held virtual story times with walking and biking themed books
- Weekly neighborhood scavenger hunts took place in Harrisonburg. Students could pick up prizes and other walk/bike incentives during meal pick-up.
- Statewide, continued to host national events, but with a twist to adhere to COVID restrictions





### Bike to Anywhere Day

In the absence of Bike to School Day the National Center for Safe Routes to School continued to host national events, such as Bike to Anywhere Day. Due to COVID restrictions students could no longer bike in large groups to school, instead students were encouraged to bike, walk, and run, in uncrowded areas. **Bike to Anywhere Day was established to encourage students to remain active**. The first event took place on May 6, 2020.

In addition to hosting Bike to School Day alternatives we provided parents and students with ideas and suggestions to keep them active while remaining compliant with COVID regulations. **Walk to School Day Any Way You Can** resources were put on the walkbiketoschool.org website for parents and students to access. Those who wanted to register an event were able to so from the site and were encouraged to register even if they only had a few participants.



Walk to School Day, Any Way You Can! Virginia was #1 in registrations, with 239 events at 209 schools.
